MenCare Vietnam attracts thousands of participants to campaign against domestic violence



VIETNAM - This spring, the <u>Center for Studies and Applied Sciences in Gender, Families, Women and Adolescents</u> (CSAGA), <u>MenCare Vietnam</u>'s coordinator, organized a media campaign to prevent domestic violence in three provinces: Ha Nam, Hung Yen and Bac Ninh. Campaign activities included street parades, an exhibition with portraits of caring, non-violent men and a "Responsible Fathers" contest (which included activities like bathing and cooking for children). The campaign has attracted thousands of participants, forming a widespread movement to prevent domestic violence.

MenCare+ Rwanda engages men as partners in maternal, newborn and child health



RWANDA - "Before, I thought women were supposed to do all the things in the household – fetch water, prepare meals, sweep. After having three kids, it was a challenge," says Jean Pierre, a 29-year-old father of triplets in Rwanda.

"After group education," he continues, "I am now aware that I have to be a part of all the household activities – including caring for children, feeding them and preparing their clothes."

Jean Pierre learned how taking more responsibility for housework and childcare has a positive impact for both him and his family, after participating in fathers groups through Rwanda's MenCare+ project.

In Rwanda, MenCare's global co-coordinator <u>Promundo</u> is working with the Rwanda Men's Resource Center (<u>RWAMREC</u>) to engage men, ages 18 to 35, as partners in sexual and reproductive health and in maternal,

Sonke Gender Justice supports petition for 10 days paternity leave in South Africa

"This month. Hendri Terblanche gave birth to an important petition, just eight months after his twin children were born prematurely. His petition, which seeks to provide new fathers with 10 days paternity leave, was submitted to the National Council of Provinces (NCOP) and officially received and acknowledged by NCOP Chair, Thandi Modise, two weeks ago.

"Terblanche initiated the #10dayspaternityleave campaign when his twin children were born three months prematurely, and he saw for himself how only having three days family responsibility leave (and no paternity leave) severely restricts fathers from spending time with their children in their first days of life, from forming a bond with their newborns, from supporting their partners and assisting with childcare duties, and from being able to be there for their families at this important moment in all of their lives.

"This lack of paternity leave is even more challenging in cases where there are medical newborn and child health as part of the three-year MenCare+ project.

Mozambique's Fanelo Ya Mina Institute pursues gender equality through responsible fatherhood campaign



MOZAMBIQUE -To celebrate Children's Month in June in Mozambique, Fanelo Ya Mina Institute re-launched its "You Are My Father" ("Tu és o meu Papá") campaign targeting Mozambican men. The campaign seeks to challenge the individual and structural gender determinants related to parenting and caregiving that reinforce inequality.

Major campaign activities thus far have included a consultation with partners; a public debate on "The Role of Fathers in Caregiving: Reflections on Individual and Structural Factors that Perpetuate Inequalities in Caregiving in Mozambique, Challenges and Opportunities"; a gallery of posters and photos; a public march; and dissemination of campaign messages in public spaces throughout the city and province of Maputo.

MenCare+ South Africa provides counseling for men who have committed intimate partner violence



SOUTH AFRICA - One of the activities conducted by MOSAIC, a MenCare+ South Africa coordinator, is to provide counseling to men who have used violence in their intimate partner relationships.

A group of men who have been through this counseling program expressed the need for continued support, specifically from their

peers. Veronica Libbie, a senior counselor at MOSAIC, has, together with the men, established a male peer support group. July saw this group complete its fifth support group session, and each member brought one man from his respective community with him to be part of the group.

Although this group began as an extension of the <u>Toolkit for Men</u>, it has developed into a new social support system, with members playing an active role in each other's lives. The men are also deciding on a strategy to expand the reach of the program through the establishment of homebased and community-based peer support groups that are open to all men

MOSAIC sees this initiative as a positive move towards broadening the network of care for men.

Military fathers in Moldova are granted the right to parental leave

MOLDOVA - On July 17, upon the first reading of a draft law, Moldova's Parliament voted to grand servicemen the right to parental leave. In 2012, Moldova's Constitutional Court passed a similar verdict, after military counsel Tudor Lazer insisted that providing no parental leave for men in the army is a form of gender discrimination prohibited by Moldova's Constitution and by international human rights agreements.

With the new law passed, servicemen (both men and women) in the National Army of Moldova can take care of their children by taking up to three years of parental leave while receiving 30% of their salary.

In July, <u>MenCare Guatemala</u> carried out educational workshops with over 50 fathers. The workshops included activities that helped engage dads in the care and education of their children, as well as in supporting their female partners.
