

An in-depth look at paternity leave

"The current leave provision for fathers in terms of family responsibility leave does not address the historic gender imbalances and it does not allow men to play a more gender-equal role in parenting," Lewaks says.

When you're working with fathers, what's their favorite topic to discuss?

"Their favorite topics to discuss are different tactics used to stop babies crying and how to handle teenage children." – Puva from MenEngage Alliance Sri Lanka

"They like to discuss the education of their children, income and the husband and wife's relationship." – Yoga Perera from MenCare Sri Lanka (Ambagamuwa Area Development Program)

"The discussion with fathers in Rwanda is mainly about 15 topics that are included in the [MenCare+ Rwanda] manuals. Discussion with fathers revealed that their favorite topic to discuss is the topic entitled 'Gender Equality.' This topic features two activities: the activity entitled 'Gender Values', in which they explore values and attitudes about men and women, and the activity entitled 'What is this thing called gender?', which aims at igniting discussions about the differences between sex and gender and reflecting on how gender norms influence the lives and relationships of young women." – The team from MenCare+ Rwanda ("Bandebereho")

MenCare Sri Lanka celebrates fatherhood through national television campaign

World Vision Sri Lanka, MenCare Sri Lanka's coordinator, launched two MenCare TV spots on national television to promote men's involvement as gender-equitable caregivers. Two video clips (30 seconds each) were telecast as advertisements on *Rupavahini*, Sri Lanka's national TV channel, in the Sinhala language, and on *Shakthi TV*, the national Tamil language channel. Telecasting at peak hours, the spots captured around 40 percent of Sri Lanka's regular TV viewers.

The two videos were created in the two official languages of Sri Lanka to ensure that every Sri Lankan can understand them. The videos show how the involvement of fathers as caregivers for their children brings benefits to women, children and men themselves. Click to watch the videos below!

UPDATES IN BRIEF

Washington, DC approves eight weeks of paid family leave for government employees

MenCare celebrates progress in paid paternity leave in Washington, DC, the home of global campaign co-coordinator Promundo-US. In June, Washington, DC's city council passed the budget for Fiscal Year 2015, which includes eight weeks of paid family leave for city government employees and which can be used by both men and women in connection with the birth, adoption or fostering of a child. Councilmember David Grosso championed the initiative, which is the most expansive family leave provision in the country.

Countrywide social media campaign in Armenia protests prenatal sex selection

At the end of August, a single Facebook post by user Aramazd Ghalamkaryan in Armenia sparked a wave of social media action across the country against prenatal sex selection. Parents, politicians, celebrities, journalists, bloggers and activists joined the cause. Learn more here.

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MenCare+ Rwanda partners with over 100 health care providers to get men involved



RWANDA - Health providers are one of the key partners in engaging men in maternal and child health (MCH) and in sexual and reproductive health (SRH). Since MenCare+ Rwanda (or "Bandebereho") began, health providers have shown significant interest in joining the initiative. In August, more than 105 health providers officially became MenCare+ Bandebereho partners as they participated in a workshop organized by MenCare+ Bandebereho and the Rwandan Ministry of Health.

In total, MenCare+ Rwanda has held four workshops with health care providers, each featuring discussions on gender, human rights and local policies on SRH, with a special focus on adolescent sexual and reproductive health and on MCH.

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MenCare Peru organizes course on masculinities, gender and nonviolence for community leaders

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PERU – The Red Peruana de Masculinidades, a MenCare Peru coordinator, in conjunction with the Metropolitan Municipality of Lima, has organized a two-month course on masculinities, gender and nonviolence for male community leaders. The course aims to engage male leaders in the promotion of gender equality and the prevention of violence, strengthen their ability to work with other men on the prevention of gender-based violence and promote public initiatives to end violence against women. The course will take place in September and October, and the Red Peruana de Masculinidades is accepting applicants for the class until Wednesday, September 10 at 12:00 PM PET.
